




The Block Watch meeting will be held on Thursday the 18th of September.

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



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

As you may have seen on TV or heard on the radio according to The Columbus Police Department there has been a sudden spike in thefts from vehicles. Fortunately for us, the majority are in either German Village and Sawmill Road north of I 270 districts. Just in case the miscreants can read and decide it would be a grand idea to target our area I thought I should pass this along to you. CPD suggests the following tips to help avoid being a victim:

- Get into the habit of securing your valuables while away from your vehicle.
- 2. When possible, take your valuables with you.
- 3. If you must have valuables in your car, secure them out of sight in a locked compartment or in the truck.
- 4. Always roll up your windows and lock your vehicle.
- Report suspicious activity to the police immediately.

To amplify, this means to remove or hide anything you don't want to lose, especially GPS units, laptops, etc., night and day. About 2 years ago on New Year's day, a guy decided to try a scam in my neighborhood that I had read about as being tried before in another city. He systematically broke into cars in driveways and looked particularly for garage door openers and anything else in general. His idea was to come back later, use the opener to gain entry to the house and burglarize them. He hit about a dozen cars before he came upon a lady on the next street over who was getting ready to deliver newspapers. After slugging her, he stole her car but the police had already been notified. He was caught a few blocks away and at last check was in jail. His plan worked as well for him as it did for the other city's bad guy (maybe a little better) who got shot in the process of burglarizing an occupied residence. "The good guys win again."



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

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Forest Park Elementary School News



The principal, teaching staff and students of Forest Park Elementary School are dedicated to meeting or exceeding a goal of at least 75% of the proficiency standards of the Ohio Achievement Test this academic year. "We fell a little short last year but we continue to make gains and are working hard to achieve this goal." Says Mrs. Rhonna McKibbin, principal. Subject areas tested include third grade, reading and math; fourth grade, adds writing and fifth grade adds social studies and science.

Teachers are utilizing the technology of palm pilots in recording the data of reading assessments which streamlines the process of making analysis and creation of reports more efficient. Reading tests are done each quarter for comprehension and fluency, with kindergartners measured for letter recognition. The first third grade Reading Achievement Test will be on Monday, Oct. 6.

There are some new teaching staff and grade level changes this year: Kindergarten Instructional Assistant, Miss Lesley Thomas; First Grade, John Kountz and Mrs. Mitzy Ellis; second grade, Mrs. Lori Reeves; second and third grade split, Miss Kinette Edwards; Fourth, Mrs. Robin Booth-Winslow and Miss Amy Lee sharing part time. Mrs. Deb Britton has returned as the reading tutor for K-3.

There will be no classes for students on Friday, Oct. 17, Capital Day, but the teaching staff will have a staff development day.




