NEIGHBORHOOD TIDBITS

- Forest Park Elementary was built in 1962, Parkmoor 1966, Woodward Park 1966, Northland High School 1966, and Avalon 1977. Northland Mall opened in 1964.
- Rex Williamson was first Forest Park Civic Association President in 1962. The Forester started publication in 1965.
- Epworth Church began in 1963, land was purchased on Karl Rd. and a Service of Consecration was held in the new building in 1967
- Northland High School opened its doors on September 7, 1966 as Northland Junior-Senior High. Woodward Park had it's first students during the 1967-1968 year. That year Northland became just a High School, 9-12 grade.
- ♦ The North Y broke ground in 1977, opening in 1978. the swimming pool came much later.
- ♦ The Forest Park Civic Association sponsored the Baseball and Basketball leagues for a great many years.
- ♦ Early advertisers in the Forester still advertise to this day. Northland Heating and Cooling since 1968.
- Northland Terrace (now Villa Angela) opened in 1978 on Karl Rd.

HOMESTEAD EXEMPTION

While I was preparing this special edition Forester, I kept going to the Franklin County Auditor's website to look for dates when construction started on many homes. I have noticed on some, that the resident isn't shown receiving the Homestead Exemption on their property taxes. I have copies of the form you can prepare and mail to the Auditors office. Call me at 885-1434 for a copy.

What is the Homestead Exemption? The homestead exemption provides a reduction in property taxes to any senior or disabled citizen, regardless of income, on the dwelling that is that individual's *principal place of residence* and up to one acre of land of which an eligible individual is an owner. The reduction is equal to the taxes that would otherwise be charged on up to \$25,000 of the market value of an eligible taxpayer's homestead. The website is:

REMEMBER WHEN?

- ❖ June 1961 36 Homes in Forest Park Parade of Homes, (3 on Sandalwood Drive, 4 on Boxwood Drive, and 29 on Hazelwood Road).
- ❖ Forest Park West was one of the first self-contained community in the United States
- ❖ Developed by Metzger Brothers, Phil, Gene, and Ralph.
- ❖ Forest Park Plaza (see centerfold) also included a service station at the corner of Yellowwood and Cherrywood, owned by George Kinney.
- ❖ We also had the swimming pool and tennis courts. Forest Park Elementary school was built in 1962 and the Sequoia Bowling alley came later.
- Early students were bused Cooke Road Elementary, Clinton Junior High, and Brookhaven High School.
- ❖ Karl Road was a narrow two lane road that had deep ditches on either side. You stayed in the middle of the road or you were in the ditch.
- ❖ The Forest Park Civic Association was incorporated in April 1962. They met at Hi Timbers Golf Club that was on Morse Road approximately where the Huntington Bank Business Center is today.
- ❖ We talked the city into giving softball equipment so the men and women could put baseball diamonds in Woodward Park for use in 1962 instead of waiting for the city to do it 3 or 4 years late.
- ❖ Forest Park and Kar-Mel Village formed together (Woodward Park was not developed yet) for the For-Mel Women's Club which is still active today, also a garden club, The Lamplighter, which attended to the two islands for many years.
- ❖ Many bowlers from Forest Park and Kar-Mel Village joined together and traveled to Westerville Lanes to bowl before Sequoia Lanes was built.
- ❖ Morse Road was also two lanes, but not as narrow as Karl Rd. There used to be a small airport about where the Pottery Barn is now located on Morse Rd.
- Tamarack Circle was a two way street until the 1970's, but due to numerous accidents, was made one way.
- Our first zip code was 43224, and the closest post office was on Huy Rd. in Northern Lights.
- ❖ Did you wonder about the large white house on the west side of Karl Rd? It was owned by Jack Fullen of Ohio State University. Many of the streets in Kar-Mel are named for the family, such as Julie Place and Fullen Drive, as the ground was sold for Kar-Mel Village.
- There were no homes on the west side of Karl, so you could look at the farmed owned by the Harmons. They became friends of Forest Park, by furnishing wagons for the Christmas Parades, Hayrides into the woods, and cookouts. Early Christmas parties were held in a building located close to the zoo.



Our Pools

Sequoia Pool and Tamarack Pool were two great assets to the Forest Park Community providing a safe and clean environment for family activities. Sequoia opened on June 15, 1962. Each facility contained a 50 meter by 25 meter swimming pool with a 3 meter and 10 meter diving board. The pools offered the Red Cross Lesson Program, Tiny Tots classes and private swim lessons for those interested. Many special events were scheduled, such as parties of graduation, birthdays and even weddings took place after closing hours.

Members had the opportunity to use both pools especially when one was closed for a special activity. Master Swim Meets for those 25 years to 90; US Swim Meets for age group swimmers was a yearly event and the local team participated in the League competition with Sequoia winning a major number of Championships. The big summer event was the 4th of July Pot Luck with everyone bringing their favorite dish, games followed.

Tennis was a big favorite at Tamarack and the spirit of family prevailed at both pools. Sequoia Pool received an award for being "the Outstanding Pool" in the Northland area.

The summer of 1976 was a very exciting year at Sequoia Swim Club as two of the members on the Swimming and Diving team won international recognition. Debbie Keplar and Tina Bischoff were the outstanding athletes recognized. Debbie qualified for the 1976 Olympics in Montreal, Canada and placed third winning the Bronze Medal in Platform diving. She had been a participating member at Sequoia Pool for a number of years and now resides in Marysville, Ohio.

Tina Bischoff swam the English Channel on August 5, 1976 at the age of 17. Her swim began in Dover

England on Shakespeare Beach and ended at Cap Gris Nay, France a total of 22 miles. She established a world record of 9 hours 3 minutes which had been held previously for 13 yeas. Her boat Captain claimed it a spectacular swim because of the extreme tides and current. Tina now resides in Sarasota, Florida.




Items needed.
